The broadside is an advertisement for the school which recently completed a large addition, listing faculty, expenses for students, and "Notices of the Press". The pamphlet, a single leaf folded to make four pages is in the form of a letter from the President of the College, solicits students and celebrates the institutions 25th anniversary. Founded in 1850 (curiously, also in the same year that Clara Barton founded a school in Bordentown), while well-acclaimed, the school finally closed in 1900. [BTC#393950]
