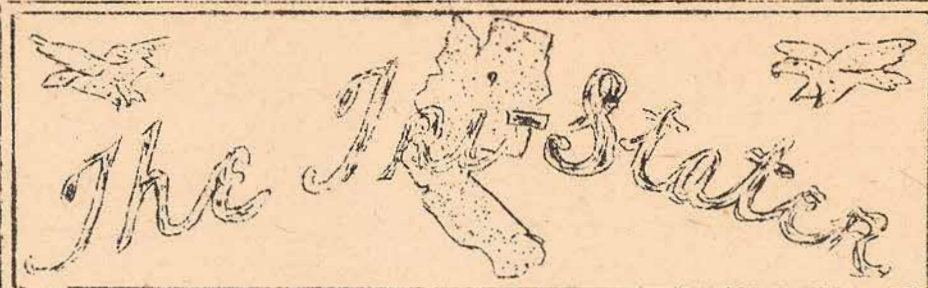

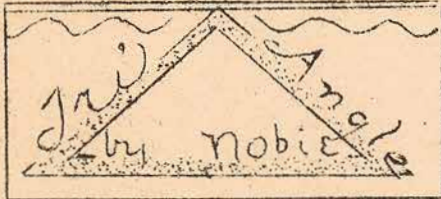

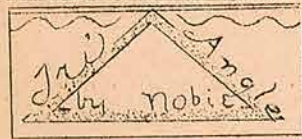

Solly, what a hectic week. I'm positively dead! The turkey and Thanksgiving day left me really breathless.

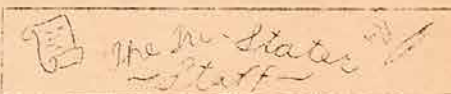
