

First edition. 24mo. Stapled printed gray wrappers. 31pp. Slight bump on one corner else near fine. Shaw recommends self-reliance and making the best of segregation. His dedication begins: “To my sainted Mother, born a slave, unable to read or write until she was taught by her children.”

In 1950 Shaw, who was born in Mississippi, became the first African-American to serve as Bishop of a predominantly white Methodist Episcopal conference. *OCLC* locates a single copy (U.C. Davis), and we know of one other copy. [\[BTC#423491\]](#)
