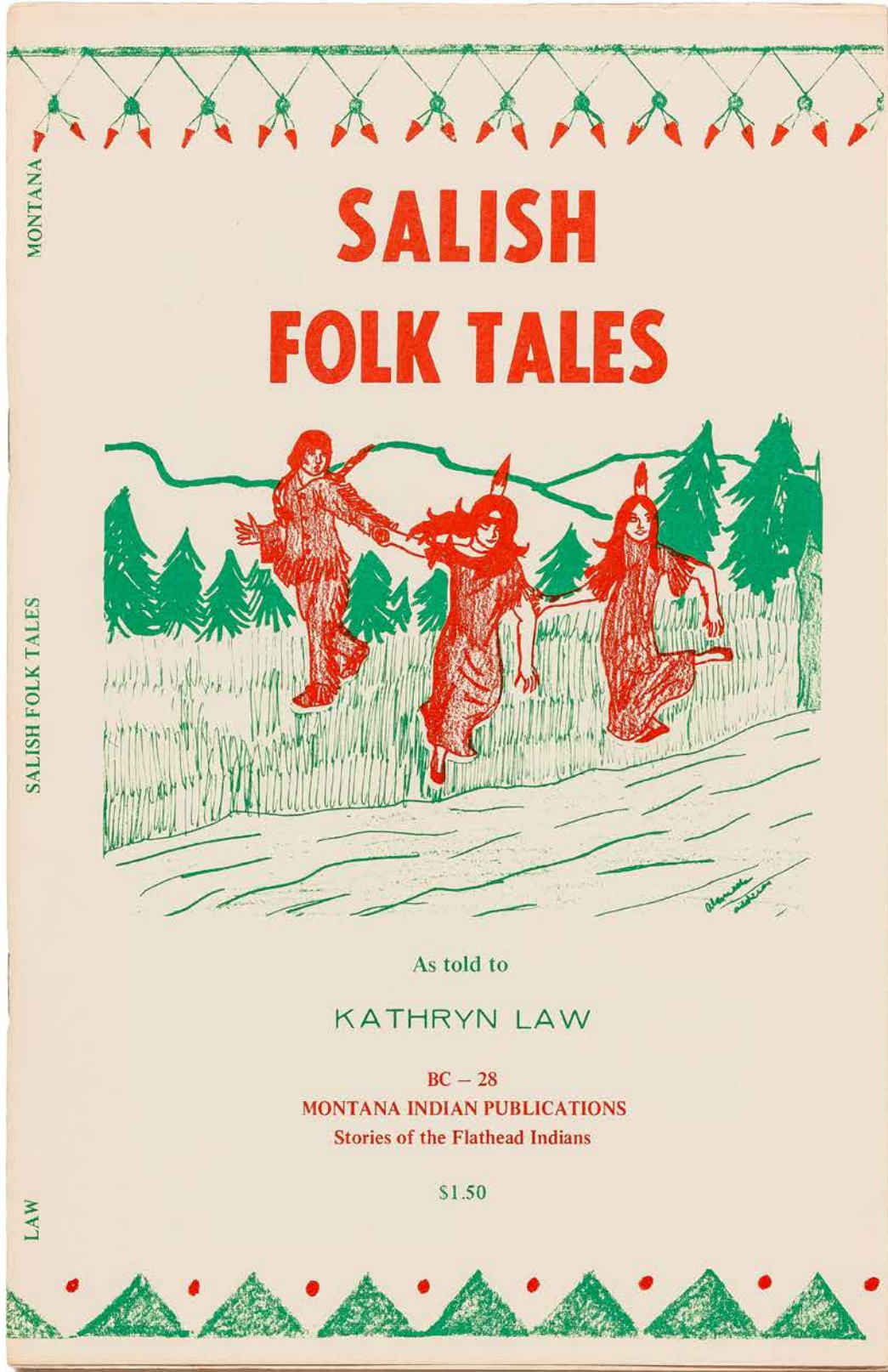

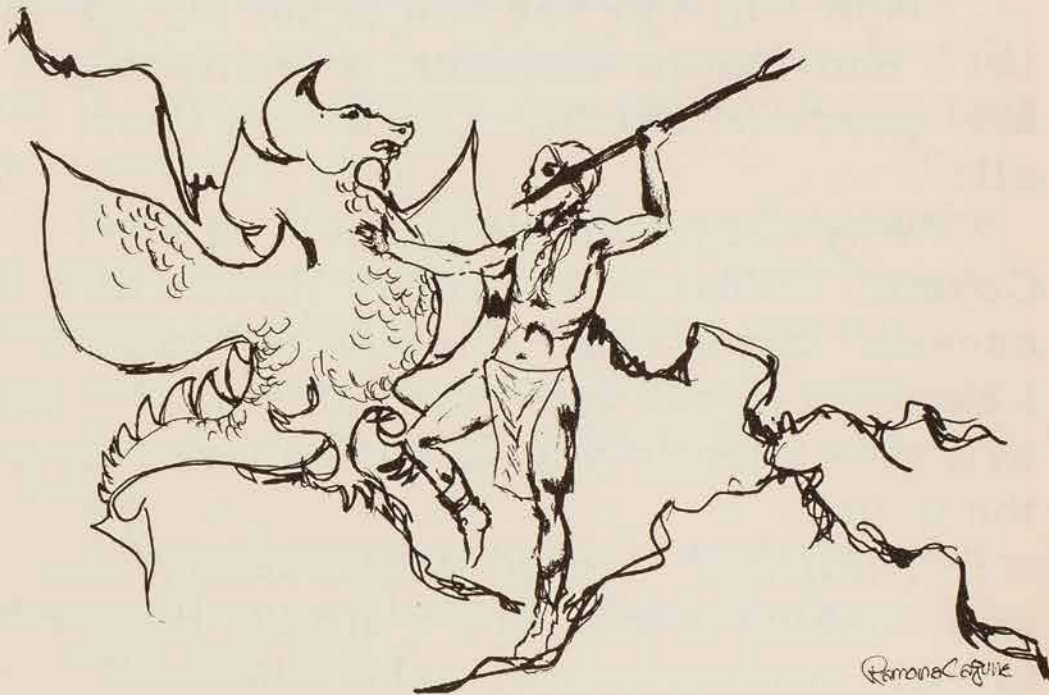

"Let's go!"

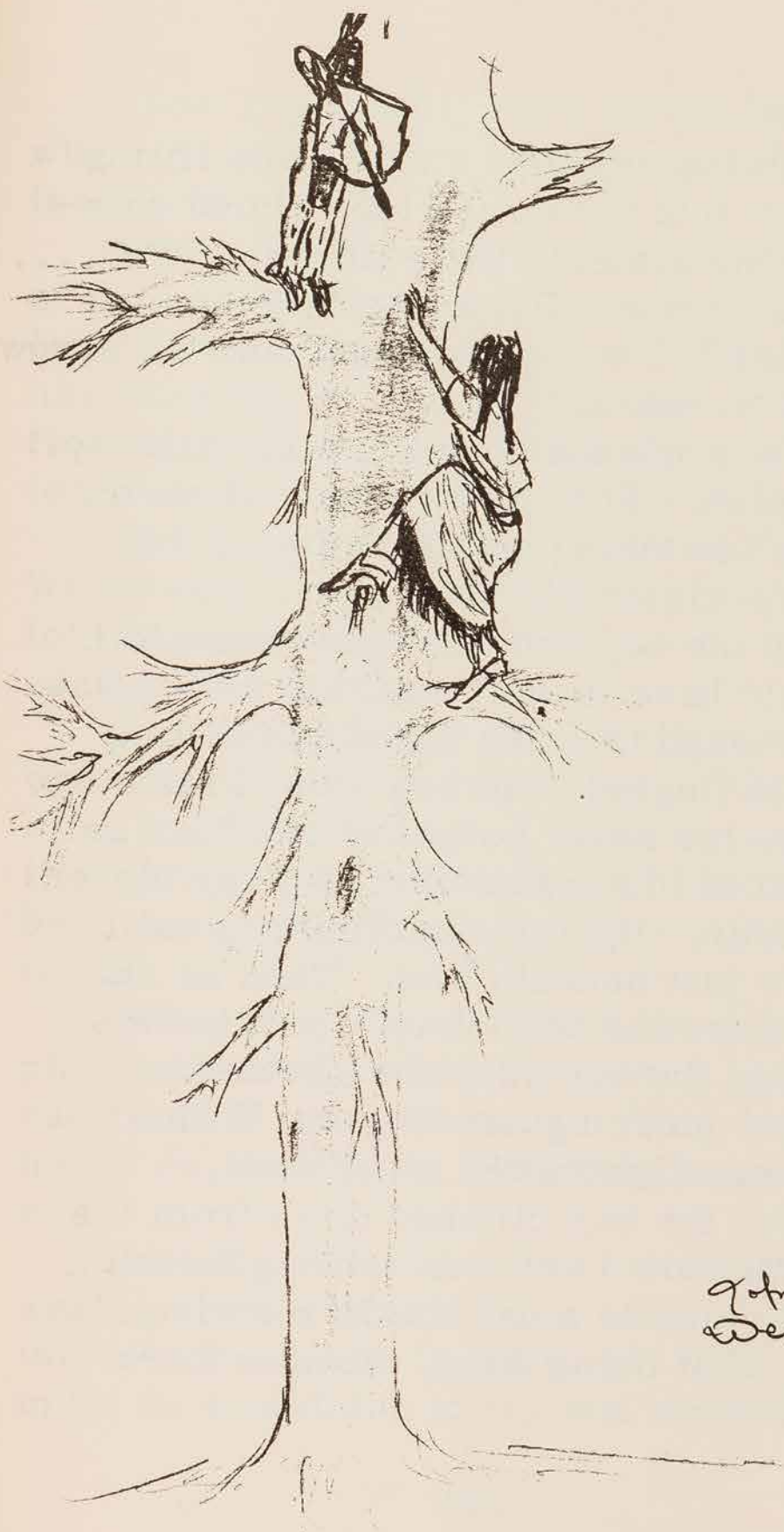
So Coyote took the monster's spear and shield and began to run down the steep slope.
